**Big Discover Languages Event
Held at California State Fair**

Have you ever played Fox and Geese? Umake? Dithwai? How about Cows and Leopards or Tiu-ü? Maybe you've played Mühle or the Native American game Gins? Could playing games help with language advocacy? CLTA decided to find out with an ambitious community outreach event. On August 17, there was a special *Discover Languages*® event held at the California State Fair and FLAGS made it happen!

The activity was held in the youth education building at the fairgrounds. Hundreds of children and families stopped by to play those children's games from around the world—and they took away a greater appreciation for the benefits and importance of multilingualism. To prepare for the event, I researched and constructed the games over the summer, which come from countries as diverse as Germany, South Africa, Sri Lanka and Iceland, among others. Twelve volunteers, mostly from FLAGS, including ACTFL's 2007 National Language Teacher of the Year Christine Lanphere, taught the games and gave information on where the games

To give you an update, last August 17th, the all day FLAGS International Interactive Games Exhibit created by Nicole Naditz for the State Fair was a great success. Families visited our booth to play games, talk about language learning, take the "Are you smarter than a language teacher" quiz, and spin the wheel for Discover Languages merchandise. The event was so well received that we are planning to return to the fair next summer. As Nicole says, "It is a lot of fun--you get to play games and give away free stuff, so volunteers are sure to be a hit with the fairgoers." Speaking of getting involved, we would like to thank those FLAGS members who attended our September 20th Fall Flags Workshop at Bella Vista High School on "PowerPoint for Language Teachers: from the Basics to the Best". We were pleased to be able to give participants a free 2GB flash drive on which to review the wonderful presentations of Christine Lanphere, Kristina Jenkins, and Nicole Naditz. Christine introduced participants to the fundamentals of effective PowerPoint presentations, Kristina added transitions, images, and sound, and Nicole took us into the high tech world of embedded audio, video and web links. Our 27 participants came away with some very useful skills they could immediately use in their classrooms.

Last September we were also fortunate in getting our draft Foreign Language Standards. Capitol Foreign Language Project members spent Saturday, October 4th at Sacramento State making suggestions and revisions to the draft. 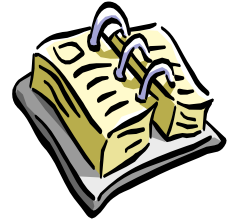

At the flagsteacher.com website, you can download all of the forms from the links provided at the bottom of the page. The **Outstanding New Teacher Award** honors a teacher new to the profession who has been a world language teacher for three years or less, **Outstanding Teacher Award** honors an accomplished teacher who has been a world language teacher for at least four years and who is an inspiration to everyone, and the **President’s Award** recognizes a person who isn’t a world language teacher, but whose support and efforts give us strength and keep our programs vibrant.
